### School Vision



### Bell Times

**Morning bell rings at 8:55am**. It is important that students are punctual, so they do not miss learning time. If your child is late, they will need a note from the office before coming to class. This is to be given to the class teacher. Students go straight to class at 8:55am and formal lessons begin promptly at 9am. Students who arrive to class after 9am are required to go to the office for a late note.

If you need to collect your child early, you will need to go to the office and sign him/her out. The afternoon bell rings at 3:00pm.

Attendance is vital for student success. If your child is absent, we require a note detailing dates and a reason for their absence on the first day they return to school.

### SchoolUniform

Thank you to the school and MUE for gifting a sport shirt to each student. This was a once off gift and sport shirts will need to be purchased in the future. The uniform is to be worn every day – full school uniform including black shoes on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday and sport uniform on Wednesday and Friday. School hats must be worn every day. #### Communication

Blue notes folders have been issued to every student. This folder must come to school every day. Important notes and documentation will be sent home in these folders. If your child loses it, you will need to replace it. Notes and other important information can be found on the Audri app.

Any money should come to school in a clearly labelled envelope with your child's name, class, amount and payment details. Please remind your child to take this to the office before school.

Please connect with your child's digital portfolio and class teacher on SeeSaw. This allows you to share their learning at school with home. Seesaw also bridges the gap between home and school while celebrating student learning. All staff have agreed to respond to parents on the Seesaw application within 48 hours during the working week between the hours of 8:00 am and 6:00 pm from Monday – Friday during the school term. SeeSaw notifications will be muted after these hours.

# Behaviourrat fast ttills

Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) is an evidence-based whole school process to improve learning outcomes for all students. PBL establishes strong school-wide universal systems that promote early intervention, and the teaching and acknowledging of social-emotional skills. Please see the following NSW DoE Behaviour Code information sheet for students and carers and our school based flow chart for managing behaviour.



## Champion Time

Champion time is a school initiative where students select a 'Champion' to interact and eat with during play break 3 eating time.

Students are provided with an opportunity to engage in meaningful conversations with their champion and are building authentic connections with staff across the school - ensuring that every child has a champion onsite!

Students are more likely to be more engaged and motivated in their learning when they feel a sense of belonging and connectedness.



Throughout the week, your child will attend a variety of other classes or programs that the school has on offer.

• Creative and Performing Arts - Monday or Tuesday

All classroom teachers receive release from face to face teaching duties to have time to collaborate with colleagues and plan learning. During one of these sessions, students will go to a creative and performing arts class.

• Library - Mondays / Tuesdays

In addition to the creative arts classes, students will visit the library with our school librarian once a week. During this time they will engage in History or Geography lessons while borrowing from our fully resourced school library.

• Zing Active - Wednesdays

As a part of the Physical Education Health and Personal Development key learning area all classes engage in Zing Active. During this time, class teachers and an external provider run physical education lessons.

• Special religious education (SRE) - Tuesdays 2pm SRE is education in the beliefs and practices of an approved religious persuasion. Under the Education Act 1990, section 32, government schools allow time for special religious education. It is delivered by authorised representatives of approved religious groups to students who have nominated that religion. At East Hills PS, SRE runs on Tuesday afternoons from 2:00pm-2:30pm.

#### Assembly

Assemblies run on a Thursday afternoon from 2pm. K-2 Assemblies are held in odd weeks and 3-6 in even weeks. In Week 10 of each term we hold a K-6 whole school assembly.







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• Primary School Sports Association (PSSA) & School Sport - Fridays

On Friday's 3-6 students have the opportunity to represent our school in PSSA. Students who don't wish to or don't make a PSSA team will engage in sporting activities at school.



Please label all your child's belongings. This includes hats, jumpers, drink bottles and containers, and other resources they use including pencil cases and library bags. This makes returning lost items to the correct owner easier.

# tiones weardings = Read Every Day)

Regular home reading is recommended, with students encouraged to borrow challenging books from the library and return them weekly. Red folders are provided to all students. Our RED (Read Every Day) program promotes a love of reading. Each child receives a red folder with a book, a reading log, and parental tips. The book is chosen by the teacher, usually at the child's reading level. At school, they read a higher level with teacher support. The reading log tracks progress and contributes to class rewards. 20 minutes of reading daily is suggested. To further encourage students to read, a class tree is set up in the classroom to represent the class' reading growth as a whole. When students demonstrate on their reading log consistent reading, they receive a leaf that becomes a part of the tree to help it flourish, as they do in their reading. Students are also encouraged to reflect on their reading and reward themselves with Brag Tags, which are linked to our learner dispositions.

# Mastery Learning

Labelling

There is no formalised homework, however all students have been allocated Mathletics and Reading Eggs accounts. The expectation is that all students read every night and complete these online activities. Readers can be borrowed from the library or classroom teacher. Some students may also bring home PowerPack activities, which must be completed and returned to their teacher.

Learning a skill to mastery requires practice! Think about learning to walk, tieing shoes or even learning to drive - practice makes perfect! We encourage all students to practice their skills that they've learnt at school at home.










# New-Syllabus

This year marks the introduction of an innovative new syllabus for English and Mathematics across K-6 students, promising an exciting shift in educational practices. With a focus on enhancing critical thinking, problem-solving, and creativity, the English curriculum integrates literature exploration with writing skills, fostering a deeper appreciation for language and communication. Simultaneously, the Mathematics syllabus emphasises real-world applications, promoting numerical fluency alongside conceptual understanding. Designed to align with modern educational standards, this curriculum overhaul aims to equip students with the essential skills needed for success in an increasingly complex world. As it is implemented for the first time this year, educators and students alike anticipate the transformative impact it will have on learning outcomes and educational experiences.









Each year, the students at East Hills Public School will be taught subjects from syllabuses developed by the NSW Education Standards Authority. NSW syllabuses provide an outline of the requirements for teaching and learning in various subjects for stages of students' learning. They also contain the outcomes and content which are intended to be inclusive of the learning needs of all students, including:

- Aboriginal students
- students with disability
- high potential and gifted education
- students learning English as an additional language or dialect (EAL/D).

Our teaching and learning programs are designed with the needs of your child at the core. Programs are adapted to cater for the needs of each student in the class. Our teachers use a range of high-quality resources to deliver the teaching and learning. The planned curriculum for this year can be accessed via the NSW DoE website and resource hub.

### Mathematics - K-6



With the implementation of new syllabus documents, our teachers are adapting a new pedagogical approach to teaching mathematics. The new syllabus and our peadagogical approach;

- take a 'connectionist' approach that reflects the 'big ideas' of mathematics in the early years of school;
- highlight and reinforce the role of working mathematically and student reasoning; and
- include rich mathematical tasks, resources and opportunities for assessment and differentiation.



# English = e 16




- There are pedagogical changes including a focus on foundational skills and conceptual understandings of English however these are not new to EHPS!
- There are clear expectations for teaching reading, including phonics, oral language and fluency.
- The syllabus focuses on students learning to create written texts through planning, creating and revising.

# Spelling Mastery

Across Years 1-6 students at EHPS participate in Spelling Mastery. Spelling Mastey is a Direct Instruction program that explicitly teaching spelling. Students are placed in a level that is within their zone of proximal development and work is tailored to their needs. Spelling Mastery runs 4 days a week, where students are supported in smaller groups and may go to other classes or learning spaces to participate in the program.



# Science and Technology

At East Hills Public School, classroom teachers deliver science and technology lessons to students. Students explore scientific and technological concepts and gain knowledge and understanding of the world. Students develop skills in conducting scientific investigations and designing and producing solutions through learning about the Living World, Material World, Physical World, Earth and Space, and Digital Technologies.

### Creatives Arits

Study in the Creative Arts provides students with the fundamental skills, creative expertise and critical thinking capabilities for the future world of work. Creative Arts students experience and develop the skills required to create and test ideas, generate creative works with confidence, shape inquiry and evaluate and reflect on what they do. Study in the creative arts prepares students to be significant producers and informed consumers of culture. At East Hills Public School, a creative arts teacher delivers lessons to students.

#### Human Society & Its Environment.

Human society and it's environment (H.S.I.E) is made up of **history** and **geography** units of work. These key learning area's are the study of how humans interact with the world, how society operates and how it is changing. Through the study of history and geography, students develop the skills to prepare them to actively and responsibly participate as informed citizens in the contemporary world. At East Hills Public School, History and Geography are integrated into library lessons.



#### Personal Bevelopments Health and Physical Education

Students develop the knowledge, understanding, skills and attitudes needed to take action to protect and enhance their own and others' health, safety and wellbeing in varied and changing contexts. Physical education is fundamental to the acquisition of movement skills and concepts to enable students to participate in a range of physical activities – confidently, competently and creatively. At East Hills Public School, classroom teachers deliver personal development and health lessons, and physical education lessons are supplemented by Zing Active.
